The Bones


Mr. Dave presented us with bones of various birds, including a falcon skull! He also bestowed upon us an owl and hawk wing, the main bone of the wing was hollow bone! This allows the bird to actually fly. There were soft feathers at the edges of the wing that were called plummels, which allow the owls to fly silently at night when they seize their prey. There was also a coyote skull When he presented this he taught us this rhyme to tell if an animal is prey or predator, "Eyes on the side, run and they can hide. Eyes in front, they can hunt." This rhyme is actually very helpful if you want an occupation like a paleontologist, osteologist, and many others.

The Snakes

We love snakes, and to get to see one up close was very interactive and hands on. We personally learned that snakes have a spine that makes up most of its body.

Mr. Dave was a very good teacher and what he taught actually stuck instead of just slipping out of our heads.
